This thematic area seeks to strengthen the reintegration pathway for the signatories of the 2016 Agreement, with a focus on sustainability, thereby promoting their effective inclusion in the social, political, and economic dynamics of civil life. It aims to encourage coexistence, reconciliation, and non-stigmatisation. Specifically, this area prioritises three main strategic lines:



1.1 Support for the structuring, implementation and sustainability of reintegration projects with a community, gender and environmental focus that promote reconciliation and economic development.
